New Empty Bowls At Home: A Success

A NOTE OF GRATITUDE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Prior to starting my position at **Sheridan College** and then **Home Suite Hope** (HSH), I worked with vulnerable populations, and in education in two other regions in Ontario.

In 2016, I started my first collaboration with my research partner, Dr. Michael McNamara and our community partner, the **Oakville Community Foundation** in Halton. That research project — The Community Ideas Factory — was one of the most collaborative projects I have ever been a part of. The Region and the Town, in addition to most not-for-profits and some corporates in Halton, came together for the various phases of that research to help inform a better system of collaboration and funding in housing, food security, employment supports and wraparound services. Back then I was in awe of how well those working in the region collaborated to ensure that research-informed practices were enacted with a shared goal of catching anything or anyone that might fall through the cracks in the various systems.

Empty Bowls must be filled

I have now been working in Halton for seven years as a Professor and just over two years at Home Suite Hope.

We just recently finished what is my third fundraising event while at Home Suite Hope. In 2018, our need for Don't Sleep in your Car to be successful was mammoth — and I was terrified. Under the leadership of the past CEO and with the support of amazing and generous donors, the event far surpassed our expectations and helped us to brace from what was an extremely difficult year financially.

In 2019, I had stepped into the position of **Executive Director** with absolutely no knowledge of Empty Bowls. I was then, and still am today, very thankful that a volunteer committee led by Empty Bowls experts led me through that first experience.



I spent the day of the event in awe of this community as event sponsors gave generously and hundreds of people made their way through that door to taste one of the twelve soups donated by local chefs, and then generously donated throughout the day bringing us to the largest earning Empty Bowls in its history.

The event went so well that we were all excitedly anticipating the 2020 Empty Bowls event... and then came COVID-19, a thief that has taken so much from so many people. Our organization cannot survive without fundraising. We cannot run programming and we cannot support our families without these types of event. All our third-party fundraising events had already been cancelled, organizations had cut expected funding as their profits were down, and we had a brand new program with five young single parents ready to launch, in addition to 18 single parents in our other programs.

Not having a fundraising event was simply not an option for us.

New partnership provides winning ingredients

We had already been working closely with **Food For Life** on our new programming as they are providing Food Literacy and grocery supports to the young parents in our **Homeward Bound Youth Program** when I approached the Executive Director, Graham Hill, about the possibility of us working together on a virtual version of Empty Bowls.

Out of these conversations, Empty Bowls At Home - COVID-19 Edition was born. Our volunteer committee was formed and hit the road running to find soup, bread and dessert donors. Our local businesses wrapped their arms around this event, providing amazing sponsorship despite this unprecedented year of loss for many. Our community members purchased tickets to the event, bought soup kits for our participants to enjoy and donated much-needed funds in the days leading up to the event. Over 40 community members and local businesses volunteered their time helping to pack boxes and deliver soups throughout Halton and Peel (even some in Ancaster, Hamilton, Lyndon and Niagara!!).

I was once again reminded of the collaborative nature of the Halton Region. Despite all the rhetoric around enclaves of Halton not believing that poverty exists here, this is largely a community of people who care.









I personally delivered 32 of the soups the day of the event and I was at the homes of our sponsors, colleagues who work for other not-for-profits, long-time donors, seniors' apartment buildings, and low-income housing units. At each home people talked to me about the importance of Home Suite Hope programming and their excitement that we were able to have this event despite these unusual times.

I left the event full of gratitude for all those arms reaching out to help our families build better more sustainable lives for themselves.

Behind the recipe for success

I am proud to say **Empty Bowls At Home** saw \$28,125 in ticket sales; 375 soup kits delivered; \$11,525 in donations; over 40 volunteers giving more than 16 hours of volunteering; and, \$34,500 in corporate sponsorships/donations.



THE CANADIAN CARIBBEAN ASSOCIATION OF HALTON

Andrew Tyrrell is president of the Canadian Caribbean Association of Halton (CCAH), a volunteer registered charity established in 1977. Its office is in Oakville and CCAH services the entire Region of Halton. It was originally formed to provide settlement social programming for new immigrants of Caribbean roots.

The **CCAH** goals are to provide cultural education that develops an understanding and knowledge of other cultures through programs on culture, history, art, literature and music of Black, Caribbean and African cultures; promote mutual respect, acceptance, understandings of discrimination, impact of racism; and to build bridges



between ethno-cultural groups, institutions, and the community. All activities are grounded in the core values - the four pillars of CCAH are Education, Culture, Community and Harmony.

There is a rich legacy of Black History that CCAH strives to preserve. Oakville was one of the stops on the **Underground Railroad**. CCAH partners with **The Oakville Museum** to promote resources, artifacts, and installations dedicated to this history.

A RICH LEGACY OF BLACK HISTORY IN OAKVILLE

There are six historical sites of the Underground Railroad in the Oakville community - The Pier, Custom House, Captain Robert Wilson's House, Canadian Hotel, The Granary and The Harbour.

According to the Oakville Museum research, from 1820 to 1865, the Underground Railroad secretly transported thousands of fugitive slaves who travelled from the southern United States across the border to freedom in Canada.

For many escaped African-Americans, Oakville Harbour represented their first view of Canada and their dream of new-found freedom.

Hundreds of Blacks came to this area through the Underground Railway. The influx of runaway slaves from 1850 to 1865 dramatically changed the makeup of Oakville during the mid-19th Century. Today there are over 20 family generations of those who chose to stay.

Also, in 1955, in response to pressure to open its doors to Caribbean people, Canada introduced the Domestic Scheme, allowing women from Commonwealth Caribbean to settle in Canada provided they worked as domestic labourers for one year.

Afterwards they could take up employment of their choosing and send for family members.

Some 3,000 Caribbean women came to

Canada, and many came to Oakville.

Descendants are present in the community today.

A prime activity of the organization is the provision of an annual **Black History Month Celebration in February** - a full month of interactive performances, events, and activities in schools, community venues, seniors residences, libraries, and more, in Oakville and Halton Region.

In 2020 there were over 40 CCAH Black History Month activities which touched the lives of over 20,000 Halton residents.

Emancipation Day Celebration is another significant CCAH annual event which was celebrated this year on August 1st.

The Province of Ontario officially dedicated this date in 2008 marking the end of slavery in the British Empire in the mid-19th century and the Town of Oakville made a similar proclamation.

A VIBRANT COMMUNITY VOICE

In partnership with the Oakville Museum it is a grand celebration with a picnic lunch, face-painting, kids' games, free desserts, and professional Black performers and the CCAH Steelpan Band, activities using the Museum's collection and the Six Sites.

The 2020 Emancipation
Day Celebration was a
mix of virtual and in-person
events - 200 free meals
were served in Oakville and
300 meals served in Milton,
both as COVID-19-friendly,
drive-through events.
There was also a one-hour
Emancipation celebration of
recorded live performances.

All of this served as the backdrop to premier the CCAH documentary entitled 'Legacy Voices.'

This documentary was a year-long project in partnership with **Sheridan College** that served to document the inspiring stories of Black seniors who immigrated to Halton. It placed honourable mention in the **2020 Toronto International Peace Festival** in the short documentary category against submissions from over 55 countries.

It is now a permanent installation at The Oakville Museum and the research surrounding the project will be curated there as well.

Other CCAH activities include a series of four Youth Leadership workshops in July/August delivered in collaboration with **Halton Regional Police Services**

designed to arm high school students with tools for success and awareness around anti-Black racism.

Also this past summer CCAH received a grant from the **Oakville Community**Foundation to ease self-isolation brought on

by the COVID-19 restrictions by creating exciting online musical entertainment and distributing over 2,000 free meals, colouring books and games to families, seniors, front-line workers, community housing and women's shelters.

The organization's Steelpan
Band and Caribbean
Calypso music programs
perform at seniors' retirement
residences, community events
and elementary schools.


CCAH gives back to the community it cherishes by also

raising funds for community initiatives.

In 2020 it donated \$25,000 to the Oakville Hospital Maternal Child Unit and during the Emancipation Day celebration it announced a new \$25,000 fundraising campaign for the Oakville Hospital's Diabetes program.

Key to the success of the CCAH is the relationships and partnerships established with the community and in recognition of that service the Town of Oakville recently dedicated the square on Buttonbush Trail in North Oakville in the name of our long-time leader, **Veronica Tyrrell**.






The Industry Council at Home Suite Hope is a group of senior executives from a variety of fields who help support the professional advancement of our program participants.
