WHEREAS, Black History Month was first recognized in Ontario in February 1993, marking the 200th anniversary of the passage of legislation prohibiting the importation of slaves into Upper Canada; and

Black History Month 2022

It is my pleasure to offer greetings and best wishes to the black community of Oakville on Black History Month 2022.

This year's National theme of Health and Wellness encapsules activities, rituals, and initiatives that members of the black community have practiced to maintain good health and wellbeing.

This theme is not only an acknowledgment of the legacy of black scholars and medical practitioners in Western medicine, but a recognition of contributions made to healthcare. For example, historically black people have been employed as doulas, midwives, naturopaths, and herbalists throughout the African diaspora.

It is not commonly known that Oakville has a rich black history. Oakville served as a major gateway to Canada for blacks who were fleeing slavery from the American south. (Slavery had been abolished in Canada in 1834, as part of Britain's Slavery Abolition Act.) They crossed the Canadian border by means of the Underground Railroad, a network of people, secret routes, and safe houses.

Between 1850 and 1860, approximately 400 black people settled in Oakville, representing 20 per cent of the town's population of 2,000 people. Due to the efforts and assistance of the local community, many black people were able to establish their first homes in Oakville.

Throughout the 19th century, the black community helped shape this once forested area into a bustling port town. During the 1930's, black farmers helped lift the town out of economic depression by turning Oakville into the strawberry capital of Canada.

The black community comprises a sizable portion of the fabric of Canada and contributes significantly to the prosperity and diversity of our town.

I would like to wish you a wonderful Black History Month for 2022.

Other programs include New Horizons for Seniors, Parang, Sizzlin' Halton Caribbean Cooking, a library Reading Corner focusing on Black authors in Milton, and Black history bike and walking tours in Oakville.

Community: The CCAH participates in numerous community events including the Black History Month, Emancipation Day, Culture Days and the Carousel of Nations. The goal is to ensure that the larger community is aware that the Caribbean community is committed to contributing to the Halton community.

Harmony: The CCAH participates and sponsors research studies that help provide insight and better understanding of Halton's Black community. The CCAH partners with the Halton Regional Police Service to co-deliver diversity and youth-focused programs.



The Underground Railroad:

Next Stop, Freedom!

Erchless, home of the Chisholm's, Oakville's founding family, has an informative Black History Exhibit which gives the visitor an in depth overview of how the Town of Oakville played an integral part in the road to freedom, as a gateway to Canada for many

African Americans. William Chisholm purchased land around the Sixteen Mile Creek in 1827, and in 1834, the Town of Oakville became an official Port of Entry to Canada. Ships from Oakville sailed throughout the Great Lakes and many escaped slaves were assisted by ship captains to stow away in grain vessels. In particular Captain Robert Wilson of Oakville transported many African Americans to Oakville

Upon arrival in Oakville many escaped



slaves were aided by James Wesley Hill, an escaped slave and celebrated conductor of the Underground Railroad. In this exciting and moving multi-media presentation, the ghost of Deborah Brown tells the true story of her heroic flight from a life of slavery in Maryland to her new life of freedom in 19th-century Toronto.


