#### DIANA BRAITHWAITE

When Diana Braithwaite sings, you hear passion, with sultry stories of life beautifully expressed through music. Braithwaite is a descendant of the Wellington County pioneers in Canada. With roots in the southern United States her ancestors escaped slavery through the Underground Railroad and lived for four generations in Wellington County, the first African-Canadian pioneer settlement in Ontario, Canada.

#### CHRIS WHITELEY

A multiple award-winning international touring horn player, Chris Whiteley is also a sought-after recording artist and has appeared on over 250 recordings over his successful career as a trumpet and cornet player. Whiteley, who blows his trumpet with a clear tone and a sublime unique jazz style, has received numerous Canadian Maple Blues Awards as both songwriter and horn player of the year.



## Guest Speaker Kelly Gray

Kelly Gray is a teacher with the Halton District School Board. She is a graduate of both Dalhousie and Acadia Universities. As an Equity and Literacy Lead at Emily Carr Public School here in Oakville, Kelly has a demonstrated passion for spreading awareness and understanding of the contributions and experiences of Black Canadians to the settlement, growth, and development of Canada. She has facilitated opportunities for students and teachers alike to critically examine issues related to race and to build capacity for teaching and learning in a way that reflects the richness and complexity of the full Canadian story. Kelly was recently featured in the Museums of Burlington's Toast to History speaker series. Born and raised in one of Canada's largest indigenous Black communities, East Preston, Nova Scotia, Kelly can trace her roots back to the Loyalist migration of 1783 when many Black Loyalists were granted land and freedom in exchange for their military service. She has been fortunate to have been mentored and guided by several influential Black Canadian trail blazers such as Senator Wanda Thomas Bernard, Rev. Dr. Donald D. Skier and Rev. Dr. Joyce Ross just to name a few.



# National Anthem Teniola Ayeni

CCAH is proud to welcome Teniola Ayeni as tonight's singer for the National Anthem. Teni is currently in the IB program at St. Thomas and will be attending Brown University next year as one of the 60 PLME scholars in the world with guaranteed admission into the Warren Alpert Medical School. Very active in the Oakville community, Teni received an Ontario Youth Award for her role as Head Chorister of the Oakville Choir for Children and Youth.

# Canadian Caribbean Association of Halton The Four Pillars

**Community:** The CCAH participates in numerous community events including the Oakville Waterfront Festival, the Carousel of Nations, and numerous Black History Month events. The goal is ensure that the larger community is aware that the Caribbean community is committed to contributing to the Halton community.

**Harmony:** The CCAH participates and sponsors research studies that help provide insight and better understanding of Halton's Black community. The CCAH partners with the Halton Regional Police Service to co-deliver diversity and youth-focussed programs.

# **CCAH Programs**

### The Underground Railroad: Next Stop, Freedom!


Erchless, home of the Chisholm's, Oakville's founding family, has an informative Black History Exhibit which gives the visitor an in depth overview of how the Town of Oakville played an integral part in the road to freedom, as a gateway to Canada for many African Americans. William Chisholm purchased land around the Sixteen Mile Creek in 1827, and in 1834, the Town of Oakville became an official Port of Entry to Canada. Ships from Oakville sailed throughout the Great Lakes and many escaped slaves were assisted by ship captains to stow away in grain vessels. In particular Captain Robert Wilson of Oakville transported many African Americans to Oakville.

Upon arrival in Oakville many escaped slaves were aided by James Wesley Hill, an escaped slave and celebrated conductor of the Underground Railroad. In this exciting and moving multi-media presentation, the ghost of Deborah Brown tells the true story of her heroic flight from a life of slavery in Maryland to her new life of freedom in 19<sup>th</sup>-century Toronto.

Key figures in the Oakville Underground Railroad story are introduced through the exhibition "Freedom, Opportunity and Family: Oakville's Black History".

- Examine primary source documents
- Participate in an outdoor walking tour of six key Oakville Underground Railroad sites, weather permitting


