Dear Oakville Friends and Neighbours,

Throughout Black History Month we reflect on and celebrate the remarkable contributions of Black Canadians to industries, communities, and cultural heritage in Canada and around the world. It is without a doubt that Canada's greatest strength blooms in its diversity, and organizations like the Canadian Caribbean Association of Halton (CCAH) continue to play a critical role in sharing Black history and fostering more inclusive spaces for everyone.

KEYNOTE PRESENTER

Anthony Sherwood is an award-winning actor, director, producer, playwright and social activist whose career spans over forty years in stage, television and films. He has worked with such stars as Henry Fonda, Sidney Poitier, Martin Sheen, Burt Reynolds, Jamie Lee Curtis, Christopher Reeves and Jessica Alba. Sherwood has worked with such illustrious film directors as Sidney Lumet (nominated for 5 Oscars), Ted Kotcheff (executive producer of "Law & Order") and Michael Crichton, (creator/writer "ER" and "Jurassic Park").

Mr. Sherwood was born in Halifax and is a seventh generation Black Canadian and has a deep commitment to telling stories from African-Canadian history. He worked as a consultant for the Government of Canada on a number of projects including: "Follow the North Star" for Department of Canadian Heritage, a documentary to commemorate the 175th Anniversary of British Imperial Act of 1833 – The Act to Abolish Slavery in the British Empire. The show was presented in Halifax, Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver.

On July 9, 2022, Anthony Sherwood served as Master of Ceremonies for the Government of Canada's official apology to the Black soldiers of No. 2 Construction Battalion and their descendants. The apology was delivered by Prime Minister Justin Trudeau. It was the first apology given by the Federal Government to the Black community of Canada.

In September 2022, the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia presented Anthony Sherwood with the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Medal.

Anthony Sherwood has dedicated his life to informing and educating audiences on many important global issues. He has been a guest speaker at many events and learning institutions across North America and abroad.

Jully Black is a true Canadian Icon. Named as one of 'The 25 Greatest Canadian Singers Ever', (CBC Music) she has been dubbed 'Canada's Queen of R&B Soul' by fans and industry leaders alike. As a platinum selling recording artist, her music career has yielded multiple singles reaching the Top 10 pop, R&B and dance music charts. She has taken home Juno and Gemini Awards, earned innumerable industry accolades and was hand selected to sing for the Queen of England. With her powerhouse vocals, hilarious personality and love of people, Jully Black truly is everyone, and unlike anyone. Her passion for philanthropy has taken her from the shantytowns of Bangladesh to the villages of South Africa and all across Canada. As a woman of faith, she champions important causes and uses her career as a platform to celebrate and inspire the greatness that lies within each of us.

As a songwriter, Jully has touched the hearts of her fans with her extensive music catalogue, her compositions for industry heavyweights such as Destiny's Child and Nas, and on collaborations with songwriter, musician and performance titans such as Ian Thornley (Big Wreck). She has shared the stage with superstars such as The Black Eyed Peas, Kanye West, Bon Jovi, Celine Dion, Elton John, Alicia Keys, Etta James and Juno Breakthrough Artist, Jessie Reyez, to name a few.

Jully is a major presence in the Canadian media and entertainment industry. As former host and correspondent for CTV's etalk, Jully was chosen to interview global megastars such as Jay-Z, Oprah Winfrey, and former President Bill Clinton. Her music has been featured in film and television and she has personally appeared on, co-hosted and been featured on numerous national television programs and speaking platforms including the sizzling and immediately viral CBC 'Canada Reads' 2018 appearance, a much lauded TED Talk, the Global TV feature 'The First Time I Was Called A ...', CTV's 'Canadian Idol', and City TV's 'Breakfast Television'.

On December 17, 2021, Jully was inducted into Canada's Walk of Fame (PILLARS OF EXCELLENCE - Arts & Entertainment).

Inspired by caring for her elderly parents for the past decade, Geri now aims to bring joy and inspiration to the elderly through her voice by performing at Retirement and Long Term Care Homes throughout the GTA. Talented panists, **Denise Als** and **Richard Cornelius**, have been teaching our community about the origins of the Steelpan and the variety of sounds that they make for over 10 years. They continually educate about culture and its relationship with the steelpan yet always entertain with pan classics and pop favourites.

They are featured panists in our Community Classroom Program in partnership with the Oakville Community Foundation. Through the educational videos, they teach about the origins of the steelpan as well as the different musical techniques. This virtual program has over a thousand elementary students in the Halton District School Board and the Halton Catholic District School Board participate annually.





ArtHouse is a Halton charity offering FREE arts-based programs to young people age 7-17 who may have no access to extra-curricular activities. Since 2009, ArtHouse has delivered over 800 programs to more than 11,000 participants at 94 locations.

The arts influence confidence, social inclusion, better mental health and can lead to successful career choices. ArtHouse provides safe and supportive spaces for expression and learning opportunities for our children and youth that can propel them into a future full of hope.

African dance has history, intention and meaning. As these girls are moving, they will be able to understand that each movement has a purpose. They will be learning their heritage as they dance and move. In this environment, both gymnastics and dance are the catalyst for personal and emotional stability and growth. It is a dynamic art form that can provide opportunities for careers and community engagement for our participants who choose to pursue it more seriously.

Education: The CCAH works closely with the Halton Region schools to create a positive impact among the students who are directly engaged in our exhibits and programs throughout the year.

Culture: The CCAH has established a steel band program that involves the broader community - people of all ages and backgrounds - and creates the opportunity to discover the joy of music in a unique way that is fun and easy to learn. Other programs include New Horizons for Seniors, Parang, Sizzlin' Halton Caribbean Cooking, a library Reading Corner focusing on Black authors in Milton, and Black history bike and walking tours in Oakville.

Community: The CCAH participates in numerous community events including the Black History Month, Emancipation Day, Culture Days and the Carousel of Nations. The goal is to ensure that the larger community is aware that the Caribbean community is committed to contributing to the Halton community.

Harmony: The CCAH participates and sponsors research studies that help provide insight and better understanding of Halton's Black community. The CCAH partners with the Halton Regional Police Service to co-deliver diversity and youth-focused programs.

In 2020, our Black History Month logo was designed by Charlene Pura, a Sheridan College student, as part of a CCAH-sponsored initiative with Sheridan. We then had it developed into a flag. Mayor Rob Burton will raise the flag alongside Members of Council and Black-led community organizations.

Often the only Black families in their community, they found strength in overcoming racism and worked for changed. The CCAH presents a Falling Motion production featuring Edwin Terry, Pamela Chase, Percival Greenidge, Merle Ling, and Andrew Tyrrell. It was an official selection for four film festivals: Hamilton Film Festival – Canadian Market 2020; Canadian Diversity Film Festival 2020; Quinte Canadian Filmfest 2020; an Honourable Mention at Film for Peace 2020; and Best Short Film at OFFA 2020. We will cover several "red flags" or warning signs that could be indicators of an abusive or unhealthy relationships. Statistics regarding types of abuse in different populations will be presented, as well as the impact of abuse on victims. Finally, we will talk about how you can help a friend who might be in an unhealthy relationship, and where the person perpetrating the abuse can seek help.


